Together, we achieved great things in 2022-2023



Justice for My Sister is one of 5 community-based organizations selected by LA County, the Office of Child Protection, DMH, and DCFS through the Creative Wellbeing Program to provide healing-centered arts education to former foster youth in transitional housing.



Justice for My Sister was chosen by the California Arts Council to work with other community-based organizations to impart insights on best practices for working with incarcerated youth through our Trauma-Informed Storytelling Certification Program.



Justice for My Sister is one of two county-wide community-based organizations selected to host an Artist Facilitator to help communities impacted by police brutality create community-led solutions to reclaim public space through the arts and healing.



In the last year, Justice for My Sister has received support from different foundations and government entities to hire additional administrative and program staff needed to support our programs, partnerships creation, and job placement initiatives.

A Note From Our Founder:

Looking back at July 1, 2022, I had dreams but didn't imagine Justice for My Sister would be where it is today on this timeline. In my early community organizing days, I decided to be the type of leader who makes space for those around me to blossom in their own leadership. However, as the founder of Justice for My Sister, it was hard for me to loosen my grip and really delegate—I love this work, and I truly enjoy teaching about trauma-informed filmmaking to artists of all ages. That said, after the conclusion of our inaugural PA Certification program in the summer of 2022, I knew deep down that I could no longer remain as the lead facilitator for all our programs if the organization were to grow. It was time to deepen my ability to not only make space for my team to shine in their leadership but also re-envision my role as the Executive Director of a growing organization.

A year later, we began our search for additional staff to keep up with our ballooning workload. I was blown away by the incredible applicants and realized through this process that they wanted to work at Justice for My Sister because not only were they committed to our mission but because they came to know our organization as a great place to work and a community in which they could heal.





As we expand, I'm guided daily by the values we hold at Justice for My Sister-integrity, community, vulnerability, honoring lineage, respect and making space for mistakes and growth, and accountability. These values are baked into the fiber of our organizational practices, procedures, and culture. As we look forward to 2023-2024, it fills my heart to know that Justice for My Sister is setting a new standard in social justice media companies and the nonprofit sector as a whole. We are building talent not only in our filmmaking participants but also in our administrative staff. We are making systemic change in two industries: the TV & film sector and the nonprofit field.

Thank you to our participants, community, partners, staff, and Board, who make our dream to change the lives of so many a reality. We do this work in a way that nourishes and reminds usthat another world is possible. "Otro mundo es posible."

VIDEO DIARIES

Our 2023 cohort included 8 BIPOC directors who created autobiographical films that bring visibility to experiences that are often untold or misrepresented in the predominantly white and male film industry. The subjects explored ranged from gentrification to the school-to-prison pipeline, mental health, and healing your inner child.

The program provides a space for filmmakers of color to create their personal documentary or poetry videos. We provide instruction, technical support, and one-on-one mentorship for participants to own agency over their work and stories.

The eight short films premiered at Whittier Starlight Cinema to a theater full of family, friends, & community members.

In 2022 we launched the 3rd cohort of our BIPOC Sci-Fi Screenwriting Lab

In 2022, we welcomed 13 new participants into the fold. After our 8-week lecture series, six participants were selected to match up with BIPOC screenwriters for one-on-one mentorship to polish the draft of their pilots. In the end, participants produced industry-standard scripts of their pilots, giving them a solid work sample that has landed them representation and further opportunities. We hosted an exclusive virtual table read of the pilots where participants got to direct actors and present their work to industry professionals.

The stories that came to fruition in the Lab expand our radical imagination to envision worlds and futures filled with hope, magic, and a call to liberation from oppressive forces for our communities.

Nuevas Novelas: the Power of Community.

In 2023, fifteen (15) middle school and high school students participated in Nuevas Novelas, our storytelling intensive, to create short films that explore issues affecting their communities. With instruction on media literacy and film production, our students produced two (2) films that explored the topics of class consciousness and gender-based violence.

The cohort screened their narrative short films in front of their community and hosted a Q&A where they were able to talk about their process and films.





Trauma-Informed Certification: The Power of Collaboration.

In 2023, we partnered with Arts in Corrections to bring our Trauma-Informed Storytelling Certification to teaching artists who work with incarcerated youth statewide.


Participants obtained tools to acknowledge personal and collective trauma interpersonally and through art.

We continue to bring this program to TV and film professionals who wish to create content that serves as a powerful tool for collective recovery and addresses the proliferation of trauma in our communities. As we reflect on the year, we celebrate the program's impact on the intersection of art and rehabilitation. We look forward to expanding this initiative so that decision-makers in the TV and film industry move away from exploiting trauma and instead commit to thoughtful depiction that is healing-centered and survivor-led.

AFTER-SCHOOL ARTS FOR YOUTH

Our Afterschool Arts Program is a collaboration with the County of Los Angeles Probation Department and the Los Angeles County Department of Arts and Culture. As part of the Juvenile Justice Art Project, we provide healing-centered arts education through filmmaking, mural making, ceramics and other mediums.

Benefiting over 600 students annually across LA County, this leadership-focused initiative culminated in two film screenings at Whittier Starlight Cinemas and Gardena Cinema, showcasing students' cinematic achievements.

The events allowed our students to refine public speaking skills, share experiences from Filmmaking 101, celebrate creativity, and foster community while emphasizing the program's role in nurturing artistic expression and personal development.

Meet Ocean Vashti Jude: Teaching Artist

Ocean Vashti Jude (they/them) enrolled in our screenwriting class in 2017. A year later, we asked them to step in as a mentor for our youth program. Recognizing Ocean's incredible skill set as an artist and facilitator, we brought them on in 2019 as our Lead Teaching Artist for Community Filmmaking 101 at Friends of the Family, a multi-generational class.

From there, Ocean continued on as our Nuevas Novelas Lead Teaching Artist and successfully produced three student films through the summer film intensive. Ocean has become instrumental in our adult professional development program as a mentor for our BIPOC Sci-Fi Screenwriting Lab. They have since gone on to develop a blooming career as a commercial director, with representation and a busy slate.

Ocean is a two-time recipient of our PA sponsorship program, where they mentor our PAs on-set, who in turn receive paid on-the-job training through our organization. Ocean is now a Lead Teaching Artist at Loma Alta Park for our Youth Program.

PA Certification Program: The Power of Opportunities.

Our PA Certification Program welcomed 30 participants in 2023. Twenty one continued to Phase Two, gaining hands-on experience on set and mentorship opportunities.

Understanding how crucial that first job opportunity is for filmmakers of color, we support BIPOC-led production companies by paying PAs to get reallife experience in the films are producing. In 2023, we had the opportunity to support one of our BIPOC Sci-Fi graduates, who won a grant through the McDonald Spotlight Dorado program, by placing three PAs from the program to support production and be mentored through the process.
