Our organization's growth this past year is a testament to the personal commitment of our team. The love, dedication, and community rapport that we've developed over the years have propelled us to expand our service area to San Fernando and Pacoima. Pivoting to provide online services challenged us to tap into our creative will.

In the mad dash to adapt to a digital world, we created new programs that far surpassed prior calls for applicants— confirmation of how much our community needs our work. Participants confidently told stories to unapologetically demand justice. They expressed their dreams and joy—crucial during these dire times.

We were able to hire alumni. Our team and participants alike are stepping into their leadership with grace and confidence. Witnessing this metamorphosis brings me so much satisfaction and fulfillment.

Launching our long-anticipated Black, Indigenous, People of Color Sci-Fi Screenwriting Lab allowed us to acknowledge the ways we are filling a gap in providing arts education to working adults. Our modified Nuevas Novelas for teens brought into focus a new medium wherein students developed their own podcast episodes, elevating their voices with sharp analysis on environmental justice.

Thank you for the ways you've supported us so that we can show up boldly for our community, hold space, and provide a container where stories of BIPOC folks are celebrated, honored, and amplified. We continue onwards, to break barriers within us that keep us silent on the sidelines, as well as the barriers imposed upon us by a white supremacist, capitalist, heteronormative, patriarchal society. Our stories pave a road to liberation, and we are passionate about providing pathways into the TV & film industry for our students so that they can change the narrative.

OUR MISSION

Justice for My Sister Collective (JFMS) trains women of color, nonbinary youth, and foster youth to make films with gender equity and racial justice lens, as a means to heal from trauma and overcome financial barriers to entering the TV & film industry.

We envision a film and TV industry populated by advocates of gender equality and racial justice, to champion a transformation of the industry based on anti-violence practices.

OUR 2020 CHALLENGES

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 2020 was a year of challenges for all of us.

JFMS adapted all its programming to the online digital platform Zoom, offering online personalized consultations and virtual seminars so students could connect to our mentors, guest speakers, and experts in the field.


Students served during quarantine

Student applications received during quarantine




OUR STUDENTS

Our students motivate us to recommit to this work day in and day out. 90% Of our students come from low-income communities of color and it is our mission to provide them with the opportunities they need to thrive.

OUR PROGRAMS

VIDEO DIARIES

We provide instruction and one-on-one mentorship for participants to tell their own story. This program began as a partnership with PBS SoCal's social impact initiative "To Foster Change." Through this program, JFMS has worked with 160 former foster youth, 24 of which have gone on to produce personal short films that went on to be broadcast.

BIPOC SCI-FI SCREENWRITING LAB

A competitive 12-week incubator, where selected fellows conceive of sci-fi and fantasy TV show concepts and author the pilot episode of their show with one-on-one mentorship support, informed by Afrofuturism, Indigenous Futurism, and Asian Futurism literature.

NUEVAS NOVELAS

A summer intensive for teens of color covering media literacy and film production. Students have historically created awardwinning short films in teams. In summer 2019, Nuevas Novelas was held in San Fernando. In summer 2020, students produced individual podcasts focused on environmental justice via the online platform Zoom.

ANTI-RACIST TRAINING

We offer a variety of tailored sensitivity trainings on trauma-informed facilitation, discussing power dynamics in the workplace, racial justice, whiteness, the nonprofit industrial complex, LGBTQIA allyship, and working with survivors of domestic abuse and sexual assault, to name a few.







94%

JEMS LEADERSHIP

Our organization is entirely led by women of color, and we are personally committed to trauma-informed storytelling and facilitation—we see it as inherently linked to our collective and personal liberation. Our staff and leadership team have experienced gender-based violence first-hand, which has inspired us to intentionally cultivate a safe space for all of our programming, where students can feel supported to both hone their creative skills and heal.

Justice for My Sister has been so much more than just an experience for me-they are like my second family. I currently suffer from anxiety and it's a constant battle which makes it hard to do many things. While attending the program, I was able to see myself differently and express myself like never before. Before being introduced to Justice for My Sister, I never had that type of experience or an outlet. Being able to tell a piece of my life story felt like a dream come true. For years, I've always wanted to talk about what happened to me after emancipation. Justice for My Sister gave me that opportunity and courage to tell my story. At times it can be hard to be vulnerable and open up about things in our past that can classify as trauma. The mentors from Justice for My Sister made me feel welcome and most importantly, I felt safe. With open arms, they accepted me and they understood how much it meant to me to get this story out.



I'm going to keep filming and telling my story because I want to help someone, just like Justice for My Sister helped me.
