Looking back where we were a year ago, I'm beside myself thinking of all the challenges we at Justice for My Sister worked through and all of the growth we've experienced, both as individuals and as an organization. One of the highlights for me is witnessing our graduates grow in their leadershipstepping into their power.

Some graduates have received prestigious awards and fellowships from Sundance, the Bay Area Video Coalition, Women in Film, and others. Others have been hired for their first TV staff writing job for series on HBO and Bounce TV. Our BIPOC Sci-Fi Lab graduate Gabby Jackson became a JFMS Teaching Artist and was recently promoted as our Programs Production Manager. Our prior Coordinator **Novelas** and Nuevas graduate Julissa Villatoro is now an Assistant Video Editor at Spotify due to our job placement initiative. It's such a thrill to witness the strides forward that whole community is making, returning with us this year fellowships, directing gigs, and new projects.

## A YEAR IN REVIEW

The last twelve months have marked immense growth for us as an organization. New institutional partnerships, new team members, graduates receiving career-changing recognition and opportunities, and the creation of new programs... plus a return to inperson programming for our youth! Some of our accomplishments include:

### Podcasting for Environmental Justice

JFMS's first virtual youth program providing participants, all young women of color, with personalized support and mentorship. Our program allowed students to explore themes surrounding environmental justice whilst increasing their skills in media literacy, storytelling, activism, and healthy relationships.

# JFMS at Sundance Film Festival

JFMS hosted two virtual workshops during the illustrious Sundance Film Festival. Our workshops: "Centering Self-Care in our Artistic Practice" and "Ancestral Healing through Reclaiming and Remembering" opened an honest conversation with our audience to reclaim ancestral traditions and intergenerational healing through films centered around Black and Indigenous identities.

## **NEW PROGRAMS**

### Afterschool Arts Program

In 2021, JFMS was awarded a contract with the Department of Arts and Culture and the Department of Parks and Recreation to provide healing-centered art classes to youth ages 10-18 throughout Los Angeles County. Our classes include filmmaking, theater, painting, and music classes for youth as part of a holistic effort to increase student leadership and prevent violence in our communities.

#### Step Into Your Power

A new interactive workshop our JFMS staff offered at the 7th annual I-Matter Girls Empowerment Conference, where we reached over 100 young women at three different locations, to discuss how to embrace all aspects of ourselves, and feel that we belong in each space we enter.

#### Parks After Dark with the Department of Parks and Recreation

JFMS curated Parks After Dark events amidst the return to in-person activities during the pandemic. JFMS collaborated with local artists to safely provide drumming lessons, mandala making, danza azteca, and ballet folklórico workshops to over 250 community members in Bassett and Rimgrove Park.





## **OUR 2022 GOALS**

JFMS understands the power of creating systemic change by providing new and innovative services that support our youth and allows them to become successful artists. Next year, our goal is to complement our services by providing professional development opportunities to our graduates, and paid opportunities to develop their craft.

#### JFMS PA Training Certification Program

An 8-week lecture series and 100 hours of on-set training for 30 students to obtain a certificate, production credits, mentorship and job opportunities with partners at WarnerMedia, HBO, Netflix, Spotify and others.

It is our goal to increase the number of students participating in the program by the end of 2022 and increasing the number of job offers our students receive after obtaining our certificate.

#### BIPOC Sci-Fi Screenwriting Lab

Mentorship, peer support, and guest speakers' guidance in a weekly seminar series so participants can conceive sci-fi and fantasy short film concepts and author the script and pitch deck of their show.

We successfully launched our 2nd in 2021 with 14 participants. It is our objective to duplicate the number of students serve in 2022 to bring more stories of filmmakers of color to our communities.
